



A Baby in the River

Joseph's family and all their descendants lived in Egypt. They were called Hebrews or 'Israelites', because their ancestor Jacob's name was changed to Israel.

Read about baby Moses in Exodus 2:1-10.



Using grass stalks or leaves, see if you can weave a basket like the one baby Moses floated in.

Moses's Mistake

Even though he grew up in the Egyptian palace, Moses loved his people, the Israelites. He was angry at the harsh treatment they suffered as slaves to the Egyptians.



Read Exodus 2:11-15.

Read Exodus 2:16-22.
Why do you think God directed Moses to Midian?

Read Exodus 4:18 - 5:23.

Signs and Plagues



Read Exodus 6:1-13 and chapters 7 - 9.

Divide into groups of three or four people. Take turns to choose one of the plagues to act out. The others must guess which plague you are acting.



Read Exodus chapters 10 - 11.

Which plague do you think would be the worst?

Draw two pictures to show some of the signs Moses performed to show God's power.

Passover

The final plague was the death angel coming to each house and killing the Egyptian firstborn sons. The angel passed over the Israelite houses, marked with the sign of the blood on the doorposts.

When Pharaoh's own son died, he finally allowed the Israelites to go free.

The passing over of the death angel is called the 'Passover' and this night was when the Israelites were finally freed. The Israelites celebrate a festival every year to remember this event.




Read the story in Exodus 11:1 - 13:16
